

From The Rectors Pen

April 2024

Dear Friends.

Have you noticed that wherever we look in our world at the moment we seem to encounter nothing but bad news? Whether it is wars, or rumours of wars; social strife; political corruption; or heartrending stories of human suffering; the newspapers, television & social media are full of one bad news story after another. It can feel sometimes that the essence of joy has been sucked out of our everyday lives so that all we are left with is doom & gloom. In recent years this has given rise to a new word, "doomscrolling", which describes the action of intentionally scrolling through & reading depressing or worrying content. There have been several studies that have shown that this phenomenon is having a serious & adverse affect on people's mental health. In a world full of noise, anger, division & violence, is it little wonder that feelings of despair are so prevalent?

In a similar vein, any news about the Church of England tends to follow this same painful trend, with relentlessly dismal stories of failing clergy, falling buildings, or falling numbers. All this bad news seems guite ironic when we take into account that the Church is entrusted with the Gospel, God's Good News for us & for our broken world. Have we forgotten what the Good News is, or are we keeping it a secret? Have we hidden our lamps under a bushel? The Christian meaning of the Good News is centred on the Easter message – which we continue to celebrate throughout this month of April - that Jesus Died on Good Friday & rose again on Easter Day. When those women discovered the empty tomb & were told by the angel "He is not here. He is risen" they turned their back on the grave & ran with great joy to tell the disciples what they had seen. The important word is "Joy". Christ died, he was



buried, but he would rise again. The grave could not hold him & because of what he did the grave cannot hold us either. This is the promise which Jesus made before he died, that he would rise again on the third day. It was a promise that the first disciples heard but did not fully understand. It was only when they visited the empty tomb, they realised the full extent of what Jesus had meant. When the stone was rolled away on that first Easter morning, it wasn't to let Jesus out, it was to let us in, to show us that death is not the end but a new beginning. It is a beginning which proclaims the victory of life over death. It allows us to turn our back on the grave & face our future with faith, hope & confidence in God's promises.

May the Good News of the risen Christ be with you and with all whom you love this Easter season.

Jim's Jottings...... BULLYING IN THE CHURCH

Really? Yes. Some of us have known clergy who bully others. But what if it's the other way round? Last month, the Daily Mail carried an article on two motions for the next General Synod debate about clergy being bullied by people in their congregation. Yes, it is that way round! At the moment, clergy who bully can be disciplined, but there are no such penalties for lay people who bully their Incumbent or for that matter anyone else in their congregation.

Two motions in the Synod call for a sort of "Code of Conduct" for lay people. One motion calls for bullying to be recognised as 'unacceptable behaviour within the Church of God'. Another claims members of the clergy have been hounded out of office. The reason? Aggressive behaviour by a small group in the congregation. I know at least two clergy who have been forced to guit their parish because of this.

Bullying is a form of abuse. It's really a misuse of power. It can happen to us in later life – sometimes at work, sometimes sadly in families: & the Church is no exception

So why are some people bullies? Like me, some of you may remember being bullied at school – hopefully the only experience we'll ever have of it.

Bullies are people who want power by any means possible. They want to dominate others or feel more powerful. But the odd thing is that that they don't see why their way of behaviour is a problem to others. They are often accused of having no understanding or compassion for other people. For bullies, feeling sorry for what they've done is totally inappropriate

How do bullies work? By threatening & frightening their chosen victim - by passing an unfair judgement on them in discussions. Or criticising them in phone calls, e-mails or texts; usually to say their victim is not doing their job properly. Intimidating others & trying to control them helps bullies feel better about themselves.

It's difficult to deal with bullies. They'll generally dismiss any challenge to what they are doing. They're good at pretending to forget what they've done; often denying something ever took place, or simply twist round the words of anyone who challenges them.

So what kind of people are bullies? What's underneath it all? They present a hard exterior,: but underneath all the bluff & bluster, things are sore & tender. Bullying has been recognised as being done by those who really have a low esteem of themselves. They can also be narcissists - for them, bullying others is a way of loving themselves & shoring up their own self image. They might be feeling angry or jealous of someone or something else which they can do nothing about. Because of this, they can get angry or frustrated with themselves. The only way they can deal with it this by taking it out on others by bullying. Sadly, some might have been the victims of bullying or another form of abuse when they were younger.

The two motions before the General Synod highlight the lack of an effective discipline or penalty for any church members who bully. If bullying by lay people is allowed to go unchecked, says one motion, it is extremely harmful to the life in a church or parish. It can steer a church's ability & task to share the Christian message & both increase & cherish disciples.

One warning by an Archdeacon in the Synod proposing a motion is that if bullying in a particular parish or church goes unchecked, the outcome would mean that bishops would be averse to recommending a certain "problem" parish where there is bullying, to prospective applicants.

So in our four parishes, may we all show kindness, tolerance, patience, understanding, compassion & love to everyone for ever and ever. Amen to that! **Jim**






or longer grass in autumn.

At this moment, when snowdrops, crocuses & early daffodils appear, every bloom is a joy, even more so if, as well as being colourful & ornamental, it is also scented. As spring advances, the bulbs become more colourful, with tulips, hyacinths and bluebells joining the throng. There are a few more worth considering

Galanthus 'S. Arnott' Many snowdrops have a little fragrance – but the cultivar 'S. Arnott' is one of the most perfumed. Its flowers exude a honeyed scent though some people say it's more akin to almonds. Either way, it's more noticeable if flowers are brought indoors, so pick a posy for the kitchen table. Best planted in 'in the green', order some now and plant the bulbs singly or in twos. They'll soon build up into clumps.

Ballerina' Tulips are glorious enough judged on the basis of colour & form, but add scent to the mix & they become the queens of spring. Orange & apricot-flowered tulips seem to have a higher propensity to be scented; deep orange, lily-flowered 'Ballerina' has a heady, freesia-like fragrance. Similarly coloured alternatives include 'Prinses Irene', 'Brown



Sugar' & 'Apricot Beauty', all with a sweet scent. Plant tulip bulbs late, from November onwards, to minimise the risk of the disease tulip fire.

Muscari 'Golden Fragrance Perfect for pots, this delicate little grape hyacinth is a world apart from its relative, the bright blue, straggly leaved *M. armeniacum*. 'Golden Fragrance' has banana-yellow blooms with a neat top-knot of dusky blue capping every flower spike. It needs a sunny site with free-draining soil – a rockery would be the perfect home, or shallow containers of gritty bulb compost – and will produce its highly fragrant flowers in March & April.

Narcissus poeticus var. recurves

The pheasant's eye daffodil is so late to flower, it is easy to spend much of spring worrying that their blooms will never appear. Yet they always do, with their slender buds opening in late May to reveal swept back, pure white petals & a tiny central trumpet that is golden yellow, finely ringed in red. The scent is delicious, sweet & surprisingly strong from such an unexpected source. Plant swathes of these bulbs in borders

A Spring Treat - Crystallized Primroses

Not all flowers are edible so ensure the flowers you use are suitable. They range in flavour from lightly-peppery calendula, to mild-flavoured lavender & roses (see list below) Primroses have a nice flavour & look lovely when they've been crystallised, as if they've been frozen by a late spring frost. Use to decorate cakes & desserts or save them for a special occasion later

Clean paintbrush /Grease-proof paper

24 primrose flowers /1 egg white/1 tsp cold water/ 50g granulated white sugar

Pick primroses in the morning when they're perky & filled with dew. If you're sure the flowers are clean, don't wash them. If you do rinse them, let the flowers dry completely before continuing. Make an egg wash by lightly beating the white of one egg with 1 tsp of cold water. Using a clean paintbrush that's never been in contact with toxic substances, paint the egg wash on; making sure to coat the entire surface, both front & back. Pour the sugar into a bowl & coat the flower in egg wash, then place in the sugar. Gently coat as much of the flower's surface as you can, then take out & place face-down on a layer of greaseproof/baking paper. Leave to dry for between 1-2 days; they take about a day to dry & harden but can take longer. Once fully dry, use the crystallized primroses to decorate cakes & desserts. They'll last for up to six months if stored in a dark, dry place. A Tupperware filled with a layer of tissue paper is an excellent way to keep them. Spread onto the paper in a single layer so that they don't stick together.

Some Edible Flowers Angelica celery flavoured/ Borage (Starflower) cucumber flavoured/ Calendula (pot marigold) lightly peppery/ Carnation (Pink) spicy & anise-like/ Chamomile light apple flavour/ Chives onion flavour/ Jasmine sweet & floral/ Lavender fragrant & floral/ Nasturtium peppery/ Pansy lightly sweet to tart/ Primrose lightly sweet / Rose sweet & aromatic. Use only the coloured parts of the petals. / Runner & Climbing Beans crisp & bean-like/ Scented Geraniums faintly citrusy/ Violet sweet & floral
