Jim's Jottings....

Valuing Adults with Autistic Development Syndrome – Part 1.

We are all different. We all rejoice in being ourselves. We all vary in personality, life experiences, the skills we have and the genes like red hair or the blue eyes we have inherited. We can change if we want to – but it's always our choice. What if we can't?

ASD stands for Autistic **Development Syndrome** (the last word is the posh word for a symptom). As well as children, we are now finding more & more adults as being somewhere on the scale that's called the Autistic Development Syndrome. It's not a mental illness, nor does it mean you have a learning difficulty. It is cruel to label them as weird, crazy or simply "one of those." Many people on the scale are or were geniuses, like Alan Turing.

So what's it like to be on the spectrum as it's called? Take a moment to look back on your life as a teenager. Do you remember the times when you found it difficult to find & make friends? When you did, you found they seemed to have their own words or terms for things or talk in riddles. It was difficult for you to chat with them. So it possibly made you wonder if the best thing for you was to be on your own. Your behaviour also seemed to be different to theirs. Perhaps you found it difficult just to have people around you or feel part of a group. You became extremely anxious around other people. The others may have called you a "swot" because you always had your head in a book. But this is where you felt happier. At University or College you spent a lot of time on your studies, but couldn't cope with other things that were part of student life. You also might have had a particular interest which grew into being an obsession, which seemed to take over a large part of your life?

Now, just think of experiencing those feelings as you are now, but in a intense form every day. That's something of what it is like to be an adult on the autistic spectrum. If you think you are, then you'll find in this country, there seems little help. As with diagnosing children today, it will take you years to get a diagnosis on the NHS. So it's left to us to understand & then accept them as having the same value as anyone else, including us. Adults with ADS are also people. They are affected in different ways. Autism is something you're born with. You can't grow out of it, neither can you be "cured". But just like you & I, people with ADS have their own personal way of understanding the world which is different. People have Autism in varying degrees — it's a sliding scale. That's why it's called a development syndrome. This marks how far you are on the Autistic scale. Think of a thermometer. Some people with autism will register at 10 degrees, others at 20, 30 degrees or higher, depending on how severe their symptoms are.

If you watch the fictional police series "Astrid" on Channel 4 or All 4, you'll know of Astrid who works for the Paris police force as an Archivist. She's at the high end of the Autistic Spectrum. Watch how her hands work away to express how she's trying to cope with the world around her. This also helps her explain things in a highly factual way, whilst showing little or no emotion at all. Outside her work, Astrid's interest is in solving very complicated wooden puzzles or playing the same piece of music over & over again, just so that she can analyse it. Preferring to be on her own, she does interact with Raphaele, a police inspector. But in exchange for helping Raphaele solve a particular crime by offering very minute facts she's seen, she accepts Raphaele's help in showing her how to live in what those on the Autistic Spectrum call a neurotypical world, which is what those with Autism see us living in. But as you & I do, Astrid sees things that others don't.

Service and Installation of a Permanent Memorial in Udimore for

Royal Engineer Bomb Disposal Team
Billingham Farm TN31 6BD, Monday 6th May at 11.00am
(assemble 10.30am)

This special event is being arranged by a retired member of Army Bomb Disposal Team , Peter Wheeler, who will conduct a short service & instal a Permanent Memorial to - Lt. Cunningham and Sgt. Mack the two Royal Engineer Bomb Disposal team members who lost their lives in 1944.

They had been trying to defuse three bombs which had been unloaded in **Backdoor Field at Billingham Farm** whilst returning from a London raid in 1940; but had lain undisturbed until the Ministry of Agriculture wanted to return the land to production in 1944. Two bombs were successfully defused but the third was booby trapped and the men died in the explosion, Their graves are at Catsfield; but there is no Memorial where they died, here in Udimore.

Relations & others connected to this sad history (some from Overseas as Lt. Cunningham came from the USA) have been invited to this Memorial Service at Billingham. They will then hold a Re-union at **Rye Waterworks Micro Brewery TN31 7UL.**

People from in and around Udimore who would be interested in attending this low-key Service are very welcome to come and join in and show support. There will be guided parking.

Hail Bounteous May, that dost inspire

Spring is such an uplifting time of year with the whole garden bursting into life & the woods around ripe for foraging.

If you are new to foraging – wild garlic is a good place to start. It's easy to recognise as you can often smell it before you see it & the delicate white flowers are beautiful. It loves a damp soil, in woodlands & by streams & rivers. There are so many ways you can use it: make pesto, add it to soups & salads or mash it through some butter to make a flavoured butter for fish or meat.

Asparagus with Wild Garlic & Lemon Chopped Eggs

Serves 4

20 Asparagus spears
1 tbsp olive oil
2 eggs, hard boiled and chopped
I tsp finely chopped shallots,
1 tbsp chopped fresh wild garlic
bunch of wild garlic flowers
Dressing



Juice & zest of 1 lemon, 1tsp Dijon Mustard, 80ml extra virgin olive oil

Toss the asparagus in the olive oil and season with sea salt and freshly ground black pepper. Heat a griddle pan until very hot, then cook the asparagus for 3 minutes on either side.

For the dressing whisk together the lemon juice and zest, shallot, wild garlic and mustard. Season with salt and pepper, then whisk in the olive oil in a slow stream. Toss the grilled asparagus with 1 tbsp of the dressing then divide among four plates. Gently stir the rest of the dressing onto the chopped eggs and spoon onto the dressing. Scatter with wild garlic flowers and serve.

Easy Fruit Sorbet for your fresh spring menu! - Blend & freeze soft fruits.



Whether using blueberries, strawberries, or peaches, you'll need to add a little sugar to bring out the fruit's flavour. Make a simple syrup with water & sugar to incorporate sweetness. This can be stored & used for everything. Once blended, you can eat it immediately or keep it in the freezer. For something a little creamier, try adding some coconut cream

MAY.... is a good month for listening to the orchestra of birdsong that reverberates round the countryside, with International Dawn Chorus day taking place on the 5th May. Heralding a morning the common chiffchaff can usually be heard singing from the treetops with it's uplifting, repetitive, onomatopoeic "chiff - chaff" song that has earned it it's name. Often confused with the Willow Warbler, this dainty bird sings



persistently through to July and is easily identified by it's distinctive song., which no other warblers have. It's charm lies in it's unassuming plumage, with olive brown above and pale yellow below. It usually has a pale eye stripe and dark legs, though not always. Chiffchaffs nest close to the ground in dense vegetation, with five to six eggs laid in May or June and two broods may be raised each year.

MAYwith spring awakening, we too look afresh at our gardens, and there is always a fresh idea or new plant to set in place. This year a glorious little treasure has come to light - "**Grandad's Garden Treasures**" Jim and Tim, two gorgeous grandads have set themselves up in what was the Three Legs Brewery between Udimore and Broad Oak . So if you are looking for inspiration pop along there. You won't be disappointed!

MAY.... Day Celebrations for the Bank Holiday Weekend! - Everyone loves a long (hopefully sunny) weekend. Although summer doesn't officially start until June, May Day marks the beginning of what will hopefully be a glorious summer – fingers crossed! There wasn't an official May Day bank holiday until 1978. However, even as far back as Roman times the festival of Flora, goddess of fruit & flowers, was celebrated, which marked the beginning of summer. It was held annually from April 28th to May 3rd.Traditionally, people have celebrated May Day with lots of different, sometimes slightly quirky customs & there are some great traditions in England!



The Green Man - Also known as Jack-in-the-Green this involves a conical framework that is decorated with foliage and flowers being worn by a person as part of the May Day procession. A Green Man is still part of some festivals today including one of the biggest May Day festivals in the UK – the Rochester Sweep Festival. This festival celebrates the traditional holiday that chimney sweeps used to enjoy on May

Day. It was a day they could put away their tools and have fun. Hastings has a long tradition of celebrating the Green Man too.
